Clarry and her brother Peter live for their annual summer trips to Cornwall – a chance not only to escape their apathetic father, but to experience the joy of exploring nature with their exciting cousin Rupert. But when the First World War begins and Rupert enlists in the army, their world is thrown upside down – will they ever see him again? And how will the shadow of conflict change their lives?

The descriptions of life on the front are hugely evocative and brutal, skilfully portraying the horrors of war while never being too violent for young readers. However, the effects of the war are felt by the characters who stay in England, too, from one girl's new life as a nurse to the impact of food shortages.

£5 FOR 5K IN AID OF NORTH WEST AIR AMBULANCE CHARITY (MESSAGE FROM MR COLIN LAMPREY)

I want to share a very pleasant surprise that happened to me last week. In my time at CGGS, I have tried to support the school's nominated charities by running various events; marathons (9) and the Tour of Merseyside (5). The list of charities includes Claire House, Teenage Cancer Trust, Prostrate cancer, Children with Leukaemia, Diabetes UK and Bloodwise. This year nominated charity is the North West Air Ambulance charity.

In the past I have asked for donations but this year I wanted to try something different and hopefully encourage people to run. The idea being £5 for 5k. This was scheduled to take place on Monday 28th April on the Glasspool site, a course that the students and myself regularly run as part of cross-country.

Having advertised the event on social media to Pensby Runners, Creation PT, the Running Discussion board and via the parent's newsletter, I was hoping to get some interest. On the Sunday I had six confirmed runners, so I thought £30 plus £20 online - £50 is better than nothing. A good friend, Gary Johnstone, offered to marshal and I did not have the heart to say we only had a small number and I was always taught never to turn down a helping hand! I had also asked my wife Nicky to help as well.

On a beautiful spring evening, I started setting out the course and was actually looking forward to having a run myself with these six people but at 6.55pm TWENTY people turned up to run and I was overwhelmed by this fact and they kept putting money in the bucket. It was a great run and people had a good catch up afterwards, asking to do it again, but I was very conscious that I had bombarded people for donations via various means and felt some time was needed before making a decision.

I got home and counted the money and was blown away that there was £155 in the bucket which was just amazing. The next day, I went into school to pay the money into our charity account for the North West Air ambulance only to be told that £445 had already been donated for the £5 for 5k - I was absolutely gob smacked! I was delighted that my idea had raised nearly £600 for the North West Air Ambulance charity. We have since had another £120 raised from the Road To Wimbledon tournament and with some additional donations, the grand total is now £811.

I am overwhelmed with the support and I cannot thank all parents, students and friends who have donated because this is an amazing amount of money. We have left ParentPay and my uk.virginmoneygiving.com/colinlamprey up and running in case anyone would like to make a further donation.

WIRRAL WALK FOR WILDLIFE

Tomorrow, Saturday 11th May, there is a walk taking place from New Brighton to West Kirby (by the Morrison's end of the marine lake) in honour of our wildlife, where you are invited to listen and share the great work being done by the various organisations and projects across Merseyside that are working to improve habitats for wildlife and reduce this drastic situation across the Wirral and UK.

The walk, which will be held in silence to highlight the loss of species, habitats and biodiversity, will leave from Fort Perch Rock in New Brighton at 10:00 and follow the coastal path to West Kirby where groups will be given the opportunity to give a small talk in their area of work. This will be a fantastic opportunity to hear the evidence and data which is being collected by these groups, to share best practice and solutions, as well as a fantastic opportunity to network. Now is the time we need to come together and unite our efforts to help improve the current situation and avoid any further catastrophic collapse of our precious natural world and wildlife.

RAISING FUNDS FOR EMILY



Just4Children are trying to raise £45,000 to help a local Wirral girl, Emily, to have life enhancing SDR surgery and are holding a quiz night on Friday 7th June at St Catherine's RC Church Hall in Hoylake (please see flyer at end of newsletter).

This is Emily's story. She was born in the Wirral premature unit at 32 weeks in February 2014. She spent six weeks on the special care baby unit. During that time, an MRI brain scan revealed that Emily had Periventricular Leukomalacia (PVL) – damage to the white matter of her brain that controls muscle tone and movement of the arm and legs. This resulted in Emily being diagnosed with spastic diplegic cerebral palsy. Cerebral Palsy is a permanent brain injury. Emily's cerebral palsy causes severe muscle tightness and pain in her legs. By age 5, Emily is not able to stand or walk independently.

Emily is a happy, fun and bright child whose dream it is to ride a pink scooter and dance on her own like her big sister Erin. The goal is to raise £45,000 for Emily to have SDR by Dr T S Park, a world leading paediatric neurosurgeon at St Louis Children's Hospital, U.S.A. Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy (SDR) involves cutting some of the sensory nerve fibres that come from the muscles and enter the spinal cord. SDR is the only procedure that can provide permanent reduction of spasticity (muscle tightness) in cerebral palsy, free her from pain and stop bones from deforming as she gets older.

Emily is inspirational every day with her courage and determination in learning to walk. She endures a daily stretching programme and has had weekly physiotherapy since she was 6 weeks old and never once complained about doing it. We hope she can also inspire you. RECYCLE YOUR CRISP PACKETS AT CALDAY

Crisp packets are difficult to recycle unless separated from other waste. TerraCycle and Walkers have partnered to create a free recycling scheme which accepts all crisp packets. Calday is now a public drop off point for crisp packet recycling. We have a yellow bin next to our main reception for the public to pop in and drop off their crisp packets. You are welcome to pop in between 9am and 5pm on a normal school day, or you could ask your child to drop them off on the way in to School in the morning.

TerraCycle will collect the crisp packets at no cost to the School. Once collected, the crisp packets are separated by plastic type, cleaned, and extruded into plastic pellets to make new recycled products.

We have asked all of our students to recycle their empty crisp packets and a number of recycling bins have been installed around the School to support this scheme. Please do not drop off any of the following items as they are not suitable for this recycling process: Popcorn bags, Pretzel bags or Pringles tubes.

■ COLLECTING STUDENTS WHO ARE ILL

Could we please remind parents that if students are ill and wish to go home, then they must report to First Aid in the first instance and not ring their parents directly to ask them to collect them. The Administration Team will then ensure that the normal procedures are followed to arrange for students to go home due to illness. Thank you for your support.

▪ **PARKING & DROPPING OFF STUDENTS**

We ask that parents do not drop-off their children within the school car park, as this causes unnecessary congestion. Grammar School Lane also becomes congested, especially at the beginning and end of the day with buses arriving and departing and therefore we also request that parents do not set down or pick up their children in the proximity of the school and certainly not in the areas with zig-zag road markings. Are You a Calday Young Carer?

What is a young carer?

A young carer is any child or young person under 18 whose life is affected significantly by the impact of caring for a family member with a disability, chronic illness or dependency on drugs or alcohol.

'Affected significantly' ranges from the absence of ordinary childhood experience for very young children, to the need for older children to take extraordinary roles and responsibilities.

Sometimes, family circumstances mean that that some young people get a lot more involved in running their home or looking after members of their family than most others do.

If you:

- look after a relative
- help out a lot at home
- find it hard to go out without feeling guilty

... then you are not alone and you don't need to stay silent. If you need support or just a friendly chat then Wirral Young Carers Project may be able to help.

A young carer may know what it's like to:

- do the housework or the shopping, or look after a relative who is sick, elderly, disabled or has mental health needs
- take care of someone older than themselves who would usually take care of them, but can't because they are upset or feeling down
- miss school, or not be able to go out with friends because there are things that have to be done – and there is nobody else to do them
- be away from the relative/s for even a short time and feel worried or guilty

Young carers should be able to:

- have time off from caring
- have the choice not to be a carer

Like other young people, young carers should have the chance to grow up in their own time and to be free to enjoy the experience of growing up. This might include:

- time out with friends
- time to be alone
- time to be ill
- holidays
- time for rest and leisure
- time for homework
- hopes and plans for the future
- education
- opportunities to be outrageous
- someone to care for them

Young carers support

If you are a young carer, Wirral Young Carers Project is able to give friendly advice about all sorts of things that may worry you.

You can tell them about your problems and difficulties and they will listen. You might like them to meet your family so that they can help sort out problems together.

Wirral Young Carers Project can also help you to see that you are not alone, and you can meet other young carers who understand exactly how you feel. They can help to arrange for you to have some free time to do the things that are important to you now and things that you would like to do in the future.
